- Project continuing until March 2019 with 50 event target










Aims:

- Design activities aimed at raising awareness of peatlands and their butterflies and moths



Butterfly Conservation launch new boardwalk at Braehead Moss

Date: 20 Mar 2018

A brand new boardwalk facility at Braehead Moss nature reserve in South Lanarkshire was officially opened on 10th March 2018 by local constituency MSP Aileen Campbell. The boardwalk has been created as part of Butterfly Conservation Scotland's Lanarkshire's Large Heaths and Mosses – Restoring Precious Peatlands project.



The new boardwalk will provide better access for the local community giving them a chance to enjoy and connect with the moss which lies right on the doorstep of many residents. The local primary school is also situated on the edge of the moss and the new boardwalk will enable expanded outdoor learning activities.

Butterfly Conservation have also been carrying out peatland wildlife education sessions with the local school in Braehead village with

pupils learning about the different types of specialist animals and plants that will be visible from the new boardwalk. The pupils made some beautiful drawings inspired by peatlands which were used to decorate the village hall on the official opening day of the boardwalk.

Heather, or Ling (Calluna vulgaris) - A bushy shrub with small, needle-like leaves pressed close to the stem. Flowers are small, pink-purple bells, and line the tips of the leafy spikes. The most common upland shrub.



Cross-leaved Heath (Erica tetralix) – A small shrub with grey-green, needle-like leaves arranged in whorls of four up the stem. The flowerhead at the tip of the stalk is a cluster of small, rosy pink bells. It is found in the wetter parts of heaths and bogs.



Blaeberry (Vaccinium myrtillus) - A small shrub with bright green oval leaves on smooth, twisted twigs. Flowers are small green-pink globes, but Blaeberry is more easily

recognised by its reddish berries, turning blue-black in summer.



Bog Myrtle (Myrica gale) - A bushy shrub with reddish, upright twigs and narrow, oval, grey-green leaves, looking like a small willow. Some plants may have reddish-brown

catkins. The leaves have a distinctive antiseptic smell when crushed.



Sundew (Drosera species) – A very small plant with a rosette of rounded pale green leaves fringed with sticky red hairs thin leafless stalk bears sm white flowers with five or su

petals. The sticky leaves trap and digest small inst
